

## Good Morning President Connolly and Honorable Supervisors,

- My name is Ashley Eagle-Gibbs, and I am the Conservation Director at the Environmental Action Committee of West Marin. I am here today speaking on behalf of our members, many of which submitted written comments.
- We thank you for this opportunity to testify in strong support of your board's resolution supporting protection of our ocean and coast from offshore drilling and fracking. EAC has a long history of local, state, and federal coastal advocacy on behalf of our West Marin coastal communities.
- The priceless biodiversity and thriving marine ecosystems of the northern California coast, especially the Point Reyes peninsula are **uniquely vulnerable** to the impacts of an oil spill or fracking.
- Marin County's shoreline **borders** the Greater Farallones National Marine Sanctuary, 9 Marine Protected Areas, and 3 special closures for breeding seabirds.
- The waters off of Marin County are **globally significant and provide a productive marine ecosystem, abundant wildlife, and valuable fisheries**. These waters provide habitat for at least 25 endangered or threatened species, 36 marine mammal species including blue, gray, and humpback whales, harbor seals, elephant seals, pacific-white-sided dolphins, and threatened Stellar sea-lions; over a quarter-million breeding seabirds and one of the most significant white shark populations on the planet.
- Additionally, the beaches and shorelines of Marin County are visited by people locally and internationally. In our survey samples from 2014-2017, EAC's Marine Protected Area Watch program recorded more than 4,800 people recreating on the shores that border Marine Protected Areas.

- In 1971, the Marin County coastline was devastated by an oil spill in the San Francisco Bay that poured 800,000 gallons of crude oil into the waters, threatening sensitive natural habitats, including the Bolinas Lagoon.
- In this image called "**Landing an Oil Bird**" from the Point Reyes Light's archives, you can see two of the 3,000+ volunteers helping with the 1971 clean-up efforts.
- We **cannot afford to take any more chances** with oil and gas exploration off our coastline, since these practices have a high probability of harming the priceless biodiversity and thriving marine ecosystems of the northern California coast.
- We thank your board for your prior support in reduced reliance on fossil fuels, the significant steps you have taken to address climate change, and your support of marine sanctuaries. With the federal administration's climate change denial and aggressive expansion of fossil fuel extraction, there has never been a more critical time for local action than now! Our local governments must take the lead in the fight against climate change and environmental degradation.
- We ask you to protect coastal communities and marine ecosystems by **voting in support of the Resolution**, and we thank you for your time.

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
